WISTARIA FESTIVAL SHUTTLE TICKETS STILL AVAILABLE!

Shuttle tickets to ride up to view the Wistaria Vine at the annual Wistaria Festival are still available for purchase! The 2015Wistaria Festival will take place next Sunday, March 15th, 2015.

The Festival features tours of the world's largest blossoming plant, certified by the Guinness Book of World Records. Each year, the property owners upon whose land the vine sits open their homes to allow thousands to view the vine. Dozens of Sierra Madre residents volunteer to act as docents at the property, telling the story of the vine, which was originally planted from a 1-gallon pot that was purchased for \$0.75 in 1894. In addition to the tours of the vine, the two main downtown streets of Sierra Madre are closed to traffic so that crafters and artists can set up booths to display and sell their wares. This year we have added a free Vintage Car Show to the festivities. Downtown village shops are open, and musical acts perform at multiple outdoor venues. Memorial Park is transformed into a combination Kids/Food zone and a hub of information about local non profits.

The shuttle to the vine from downtown avoids a long uphill walk from downtown to the neighborhood in which the vine sits. Tickets for the shuttle are \$15 for adults. Seniors (over 65) and children (6 to 16) receive a discounted rate of \$7. Children under five ride for free. Families of 6 or more can ride the shuttle of \$30. (No more than 2 adults).

TURF REMOVAL REBATE PROGRAM

There is still funding for the Turf Removal Rebate Program! Property owners may be eligible to receive a rebate of \$1.00 per square foot of turf that is removed. The maximum rebate is \$1,000 per property owner.

Applications are available at City Hall, and applications will be processed on a "first come, first served basis." There is a total of \$48,000 in grant funds available. To be eligible, rebates are only available for turf removed from private property yard areas visible from the street. Rebates do not apply to parkways or back yards. The rebates are not retroactive, meaning that the program does not apply to properties where turf has already been removed. There are additional regulations, which are available in full at City Hall and on the City's website.

Applications are available on the City's website at www.cityofsierramadre.com, but applications must be submitted in person to City Hall. Emailed or faxed applications will not be accepted.

Walking Sierra Madre...The Social Side

"My name is Brandon and I began Humans of New York in the summer of 2010. I thought it would be really cool to create an exhaustive catalogue of New York City's inhabitants, so I set out to photograph 10,000 New Yorkers...." Brandon Stanton

If you've never heard of Brandon Stanton or "Humans of New York," you need to take a look at this site. Our daughter, Leah, turned us on to Brandon Stanton and what happened when he interviewed a young man, 13 year old Vidal Chastenet, on the streets of Brooklyn and asked him who the person who had most influenced his life was, and he responded that it was his school principal, Ms. Nadia L. Lopez, of Mott Hall Bridges Academy in Brownsville, Brooklyn.

Brandon Stanton continues: "...and plot their photos on a map. I worked for several months with this goal in mind, but somewhere along the way, HONY began to take on a much different character. I started collecting quotes and short stories from the people I met, and began including these snippets alongside the photographs. Taken together, these portraits and captions became the subject of a vibrant blog. With over eight million followers on social media, HONY now provides a worldwide audience with daily glimpses into the lives of strangers in New York City. It has also become a #1 NYT bestselling book."

What happened after he interviewed Vidal Chastenet is beyond amazing. Vidal talked about Ms. Lopez and how she made the students in her charge feel that they mattered, that their lives were important, that they could have a future. Ms. Lopez longed to take these underprivileged kids from this very tough neighborhood on a field trip to Harvard, to show them where they could go if they could dream big enough. \$100,000 was the goal Ms. Lopez needed to raise and after Vidal talked to Brandon Stanton about his hero, Ms. Lopez, and Brandon posted the interview on his blog, which was picked up world-wide, over a million dollars were raised. Ms. Lopez, Vidal and Brandon appeared on the Ellen DeGeneres Show and lives were changed. You can see the YouTube video of Ellen and Ms. Lopez, Vidal and Brandon and I guarantee you, it will make you realize, once again, that teachers are, frequently, the most important people in our lives.

Having said that, I'm hoping that one teacher pops into your mind. For me, it was Mrs. Hearn, who was my English teacher at So. Pasadena High



School, who told me I had a gift for writing. And then there was Ms. Bessie Quinn, who tried with all her might to get me through 9th grade Algebra. Ms. Quinn tutored me after school day after day and finally got me out of Algebra with a "D." A mercy grade if there ever was one. Then there was Ms. Sowards, my biology teacher at So. Pas. High, who frequently brought her two poodles to class with her. One of the requirements at that time was that students draw the things they saw through microscopes. I have no talent at all in art and was a disaster at this. She knew I tried. I successfully dissected the earthworm, the grasshopper, all the way through the guinea pig and did my best. She turned a blind eye to the fact that my friend, John Forsha, drew all the drawings for my homework. She knew it perfectly well and passed me. These people changed my life! Being of the word-y persuasion, I got all A's and B's in English, History, anything that involved reading and writing.

Like you, we happen to be friends with or related to teachers. These are amazing people, who love the children in their classes, pray for them, take extra time with them, and use their own resources to provide the supplies some kids just simply don't have. So why am I going on and on about teachers? It's simply because we have an election coming up on Tuesday, March 10th, for district specific representative for the newly created District 6 of the Pasadena Unified School District Board, for which residents have waited two years to vote on representation. This district encompasses all of Sierra Madre to a boundary which in some parts goes as far as Duarte Road.

Ok, a lot of you don't have kids in school anymore and your grandkids live someplace else, like Texas, where two of ours are in school. BUT, that doesn't mean you don't have to vote. You do! You really do!! Read up! Find out! Make an educated decision! Read Susan Henderson's excellent editorial on Page 4 of last week's Mountain Views News! And vote for the person you think can best represent Sierra Madre. Your vote matters. It really does!

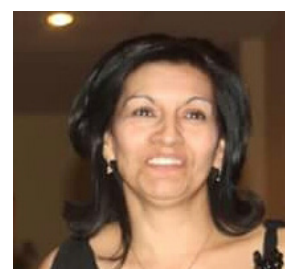

Sierra Madre Police Blotter

During the week of Sunday, February 22nd, to Sunday, March 1st, the Sierra Madre Police Department responded to approximately 275 calls for service.

Tuesday, February 24th

At 10:15 am, Sierra Madre Police were patrolling the area of Grandview View Avenue monitoring the area for traffic violations when they witnessed a vehicle turn from Oakwood Avenue to southbound Santa Anita Avenue in the northbound lane of Santa Anita Avenue. The vehicle continued southbound in the northbound lane. Officers safely initiated a traffic stop near the 1800 block of North Santa Anita Avenue in the city of Arcadia. Officers approached the driver and informed him that he was driving the wrong way. The individual identified himself and informed Officers that he was not from the area and was sorry for driving the wrong way. Sierra Madre Police cited the individual for driving the wrong way on a divided highway. This case has been forwarded to the District Attorney's Office.

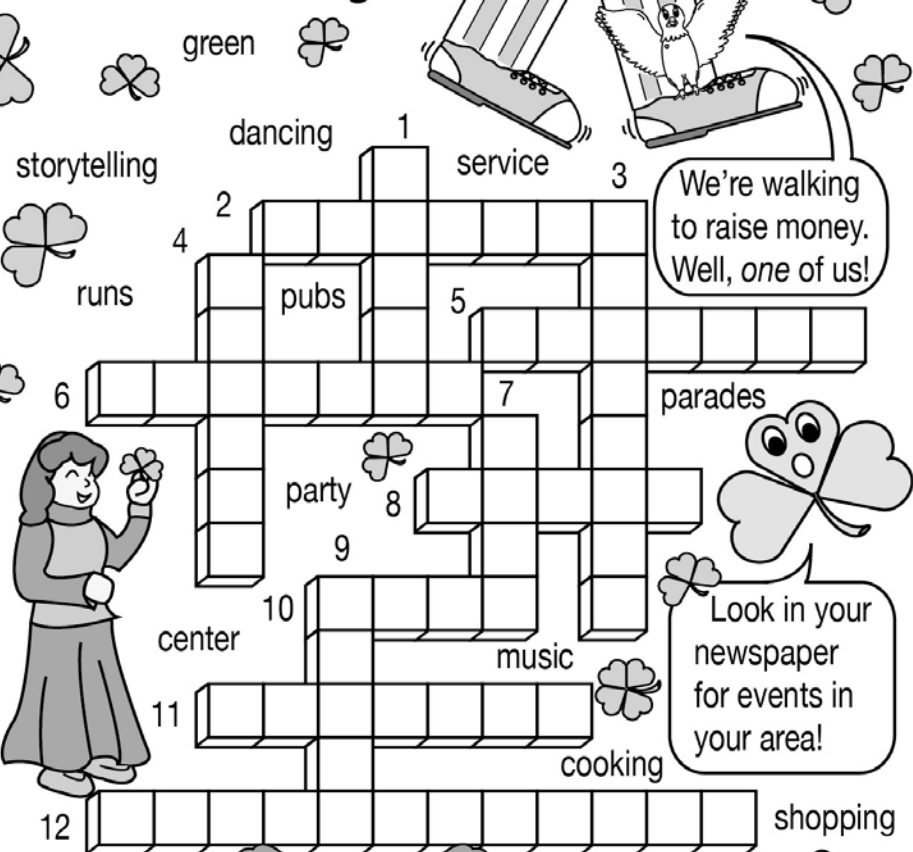

Man with Replica Assault Rifle Arrested

Pasadena Police Officers responded Sunday to the public Archery Range, 400 block south Arroyo Blvd, regarding a citizen's call of a male armed with a semi-automatic rifle and firing indiscriminately. The gun later turned out to be an air-soft assault rifle replica.

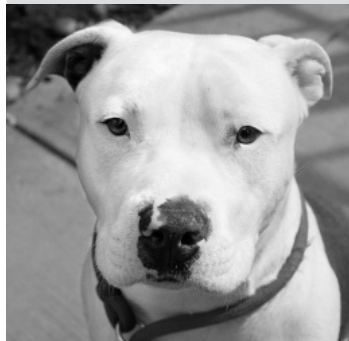
Officers arrived, formulated a tactical plan, and gathered information from citizens. Officers observed the suspect, Pasadena resident Bradley Cutler standing near the bridge and armed with what appeared to be an AR-15 rifle. Officers ordered suspect Cutler to drop the rifle. Cutler was detained without officers needing to use force. Upon further examination officers determined the rifle was an air-soft assault rifle replica.

Cutler also possessed an illegal dirk/dagger. He was arrested and booked for the weapons violation with a \$20,000.00; Suspect Cutler was later transferred to the Los Angeles County Jail due to a pre-existing medical issue.

This incident was the second encounter Pasadena police officers had with an armed suspect in 24 hours. On February 28, at about 11:00 p.m., Special Enforcement Section Officers were patrolling the area of El Molino and Mountain when they observed a known gang member acting suspiciously. The officers attempted to contact the gang member who immediately ran away attempting to evade them. After a brief foot pursuit, the suspect was taken into custody without incident. Officers retraced the suspect's path and recovered a loaded handgun.

"In both incidents the involved officers used exceptional tactics and judgment to bring closure without lethal force. Their actions were courageous and prudent," stated Pasadena Police Chief Phillip Sanchez.

City to Take Stance on SR710 Extension

The city council agreed Monday night to take an official position—in opposition to a tunnel—on the extension of the 710 Freeway from Alhambra to Pasadena although only Councilmember Steve Madison said the city should flat-out oppose all options for it.

"However people need to get to the right place on this issue, for some people around the dais, it would involve changing their positions," Madison said. "I would be derelict if I didn't say; we don't need an EIR to tell us that this tunnel would be a terrible thing for Pasadena."

He added, "What we are for right now is the freeway."

Madison had requested Mayor Bill Bogaard place the discussion item on their agenda, a final vote should happen sometime next month. The council's decision came in anticipation of The Los

Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority official Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the project. The document was released Friday.

Bogaard said they should also look at a "locally preferred" option as well as opposing the tunnel.

"A working group, of very capable people, are in the final stages of adopting an assessment of the options that are as part of the EIR," Bogaard said. "I think that it is expected... in the next two or three weeks."

Although Councilmember John Kennedy, at first, said any official stance on the EIR was premature, he later agreed they should vote on an official position.

"All of us know this is a very difficult issue but I think it may be premature to have it come before us before we have the sufficient information to which

upon to make a decision."

Councilmembers Terry Tornek, Margaret McAustin and Jacque Robison all said they support Maddison and Bogaard's proposal. Robison and Tornek are also mayoral candidates, to replace Bogaard, in Tuesday's elections.

The EIR analyses five alternatives for the 710 freeway including, Express Buses with potential dedicated bus lanes; the 710 North as an underground roadway, (variations include single or twin tunnels, with or without tolls, with or without trucks, and possible express bus service lane); A Light Rail Transit, a No Build with zero transportation improvements and a Transportation System Management of local street and intersection improvements, connections to existing bus service, and promotes rideshare.

Voters Go To the Polls Tuesday

Pasadena residents eligible to vote have the opportunity to cast ballots Tuesday to elect representatives to four-year terms for Mayor and for City Council Districts 1, 2, 4 and 6 and for the PUSD Board of Education members representing District seats 2, 4 and 6 in the primary election.

Vote-by-mail ballots can be received by the City Clerk's Office via the U.S Post Office or from a bona fide private mail delivery company up until March 13, 2015, but must have an identifying postmark date of March 10, 2015 or earlier.

On March 10, polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m. Remember, daylight savings time occurs Sunday, March 8.

Polling locations can be found on the City Clerk's webpage or in the pre-printed voter information pamphlet that was mailed to registered voters.

Candidates who receive a majority of the votes—50 percent, plus one—at the primary nominating election March 10 will be elected to the respective office. If not, a (run-off) election scheduled April 21.

Ballot counting will be conducted in the Council Chamber at City Hall, 100 N. Garfield Ave., second floor. Doors will open at 7:30 p.m. for the public to attend the ballot-counting process.

Election night coverage will be broadcast live by Pasadena Media on KPAS, the City's government cable TV station, available on Channel 3 for Charter subscribers and Channel 99 for AT&T U-Verse subscribers. Coverage also will be streamed live on the City's website. Election updates also will be posted in real time on the City website.

A portion of the Foothill (I-210) Freeway in Pasadena will be dedicated in honor of slain Pasadena Police Agent Richard Morris on March 13—the 46th anniversary of his killing. Agent Morris' death marked the first time in the history of the Pasadena Police Department that a sworn officer was killed in the line of duty.

The sign dedication will start at 9:00 a.m. at the Pasadena Police Department, 207 N. Garfield Avenue.

The public is invited to the dedication ceremony, which is a joint effort between the Pasadena Police Department and Assembly Member Chris Holden (D-Pasadena), whose office wrote Resolution (ACR 170) authorizing the memorial signs. A section of the I-210 Freeway between Rosemead Boulevard and Allen Avenue will be called the Richard Morris Memorial Highway. Assembly Member Holden, Pasadena Police Chief Phillip L. Sanchez, Pasadena City officials, Caltrans and members of the Morris family will be at the ceremony.

At the time of the shooting,

Agent Morris was part of an undercover team investigating an assault on another police officer. A struggle ensued when officers went to the suspect's home and Agent Morris was shot by the suspect. He had been with the department for seven years.

"At great personal risk, Agent Morris engaged an armed suspect who clearly had violent intentions. After he was shot, Agent Morris was surrounded by his partners who risked their lives to save his, but in the end he did not survive. Agent Morris is gone but not forgotten. His warrior spirit lives on in the hearts of our contemporary Pasadena Police Officers who continue to serve with honor, integrity and courage," said Police Chief Sanchez.

"This memorial was long-overdue," Assemblymember Holden explained. "I was proud to lead the effort in the Legislature to add Agent Morris' name to the list of those who died in service to the community."

No state funds are used for the memorial signs.

ARCADIA POLICE BLOTTER

SGV TASKFORCE MAKES NOTABLE ARREST

On Thursday, February 19, 2015, Temple station patrol deputies observed a suspicious vehicle in the area of Maynard Drive and Mt. Olive Drive in the city of Duarte. Their initial investigation revealed the license plates belonged to a different vehicle. Duarte Special Assignment deputies conducted a surveillance with the intention of identifying the driver of the vehicle.

After several hours of surveillance, the San Gabriel Valley Team of detectives from the Taskforce for Regional Auto-Theft Prevention (TRAP) was requested and subsequently took the lead role in the investigation. Shortly thereafter, a suspect entered the vehicle and was detained and arrested by TRAP detectives. Immediately following the arrest, the suspect was found to be in possession of controlled substances for the purposes of sales.

After the suspect was arrested, a search warrant was obtained. Prior to the service of the warrant,

and after additional investigation and collaboration with the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), it was discovered the suspect had a history involving firearms. With this information, a Sheriff’s Special Enforcement Bureau SWAT team was deployed to serve the search warrant which was accomplished without incident. During a search of the location, 16 firearms, 10 high-capacity magazines, ammunition, and a ballistic vest were recovered. Due to the nature of the violations, agents from ATF may seek federal charges in addition to the state charges that will be filed by TRAP detectives.

Thanks to outstanding and collaborative police work, a dangerous suspect with 16 potentially dangerous weapons, and a large quantity of narcotics is now off the streets.

 2 bay leaves, crumbled
 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
 2 pounds ice
 1 (4 to 5 pound) beef brisket, trimmed
 1 small onion, quartered
 1 large carrot, coarsely chopped
 1 stalk celery, coarsely chopped

DIRECTIONS

Place the water into a large 6 to 8 quart stockpot along with salt, sugar, saltpeter, cinnamon stick, mustard seeds, peppercorns, cloves, allspice, juniper berries, bay leaves and ginger. Cook over high heat until the salt and sugar have dissolved. Remove from the heat and add the ice. Stir until the ice has melted. If necessary, place the brine into the refrigerator until it reaches a temperature of 45 degrees F. Once it has cooled, place the brisket in a 2-gallon zip top bag and add the brine. Seal and lay flat inside a container, cover and place in the refrigerator for 10 days. Check daily to make sure the beef is completely submerged and stir the brine.

After 10 days, remove from the brine and rinse well under cool water. Place the brisket into a pot just large enough to hold the meat, add the onion, carrot and celery and cover with water by 1-inch. Set over high heat and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat to low, cover and gently simmer for 2 1/2 to 3 hours or until the meat is fork tender. Remove from the pot and thinly slice across the grain.

THE JOY OF YOGA PRACTICE TIPS



It occurred to me that few practice tips may be helpful to those new and seasoned students of yoga. First things first! Plan for class;

treat it as an appointment that should not be missed. Try to arrive on time, and grab a few props as you lay your mat out. Second, prepare to let the teacher be your guide. Last, make sure you've chosen the class that's right for you that day. Here's a brief guide on choosing a class:

Gentle: This class is designed to help those who may have limited mobility and need movement without undue pressure on the joints. The pace is careful and slower. It's perfect for someone recovering from an injury (but doctor released for activity). Also appropriate for expectant mothers or for those brand new to yoga. Many of the yogis attending Gentle are not new to yoga, so you may receive the benefits of their experience and the teacher may introduce varying practices for the class including pranayama techniques and energetic practices.

Beginning: This class is right for a brand new yoga student who has no significant trouble spots in the body. The pace of the class is slower, with much of

the alignment of the poses explained in greater detail. Poses in this class may be challenging. Expectant mothers can also take this class. Many attendees of the Beginning level classes have been doing yoga for a while and appreciate the pace, challenge of poses, and relaxation techniques involved.

Mixed Level or Vinyasa Flow: More advanced yoga poses and pranayama are introduced to build on our foundation laid at the Beginning level. This class is right for the practitioner who has been practicing a while and is ready to expand their practice. At a minimum, one should have attended a few Beginning classes before attending Mixed Level or Vinyasa Flow. Seasoned practitioners who attend while expecting or recovering from injury have a knowledge of their body and know how to adjust their practice.

Restorative: This class is for everyone, beginner to advanced. Many props are used and poses are held in a deeper, supportive way. This class is a compliment to a more active or fast-paced practice during week. The challenge in this class, is the challenge to slow down. Many yogis love this class as it restores the body and gets them ready for the week.

7 SIMPLE WAYS TO REDUCE TOXINS IN YOUR LIFE

It's a fact, we are exposed to toxins every day, from our food, from the air and even from water! It's a good thing that our bodies have a built in detoxification system that works hard to eliminate these toxins, through the use of our liver, skin, gut, kidneys and lungs.

Our liver is our main filtration system. The liver detoxifies the body in 2 phases. Phase 1 breaks toxins

apart so that hopefully they can be removed by the kidneys. In some cases the toxins can't be broken down and can even become more toxic. The phase 2 process repackages the parts of the toxins so they are neutralized and can be taken out of the body through the urine. If phase 2 is sluggish, we run the risk of building up toxins in the liver.

The best advice is avoid exposure to toxins in the first place. Here are some simple ways to reduce your toxin exposure and to eliminate the toxins that you do take in:

Avoid plastic water bottles. Drink water, lots of water all day but not from plastic bottles as they contain harmful toxins called BPA (Bisphenol A). These toxins actually induce phase 1 to create more

free radicals which in turn depletes the antioxidant reserves of the body.

Stop eating canned foods (even if it's low sodium or organic). Cans are also lined with BPA.

Read skin care products carefully! Many skin care products contain chemicals that are absorbed through the skin and must be processed by the liver. Many are endocrine disruptors which means they mimic hormones. Your skin care products should contain only natural ingredients, meaning if you can't eat it don't apply it to your skin.

Make sure you are sleeping well. This is the time that your body takes the garbage out so to speak. This is the optimum time for repair and maintenance. If you are not sleeping well, get evaluated to help you determine why this is. Many people have nutritional deficiencies that hinder good sleep.

Keep the sewer system working! Our gut actually performs the 3rd phase of detoxification. Everyone needs to avoid constipation. Once the liver has done its job, the body needs to eliminate the waste via the stool. Constipation leads to recirculation of toxins in the body.

Shake things up! Regular exercise or movement releases toxins through the skin via sweat. It also keeps our lymph system working well, promoting lymph drainage. Yoga is especially good for this.

Take deep breaths! Practice slow deep breathing a few times a day. This slow deep breathing releases toxins through the lungs.

Hopefully some of these suggestions will help reduce the stress put on your body, especially your liver, to eliminate toxins. Look for part 2 next week.

HOW MEDICARE COVERS IN-HOME CARE

Dear Savvy Senior,

How does Medicare cover home health care? Because of my illness, my doctor suggested I get home health care, but I want to find out how it's covered before I proceed.

Need Some Help

Dear Need,
Medicare actually covers up to 28 hours a week for in-home health care to beneficiaries, if you meet their specific requirements. Here's how it works.

In order for you to secure coverage for home health care, Medicare first requires that you be homebound. This means that it must be extremely difficult for you to leave your home, and you need help from a device (like a wheelchair or walker) or a person in doing so.

You will then need your doctor to approve a "plan of care" confirming that you need skilled-nursing care or skilled-therapy services from a physical or speech therapist on a part-time basis. Your doctor can also request the services of an occupational therapist and a home health aide to assist with activities of daily living (ADLs), such as bathing, dressing and using the bathroom. Your doctor must renew the "plan of care" once every 60 days.

You will also need to use a home health agency that is certified by Medicare.

If you meet all of the requirements, Medicare should pay for your in-home care.

But, be aware that Medicare will not pay for home health aide services (such as bathing, dressing or using the bathroom) alone, if you do not need skilled-nursing or skilled-therapy services too. Homemaker services, such as shopping, meal preparation and cleaning are not covered either.

You also need to know that Medicare has recently changed their home health care policy regarding degenerative diseases. They will now pay for in-home physical therapy, nursing care and other services to beneficiaries with chronic conditions like multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's or Alzheimer's disease in order to maintain their condition and prevent deterioration. In the past, Medicare would only cover home health services if the patient were expected to make a full recovery.

If you have original Medicare, you can locate a Medicare-certified home health agency by calling 800-633-4227 or by visiting medicare.gov/homehealthcompare. If you have a Medicare Advantage plan, you should contact your plan directly and ask which home health agencies work with the



plan and are within the plan's network of providers.

For more detailed information on how Medicare covers in-home health, see the "Medicare and Home Health Care" online booklet at medicare.gov/pubs/pdf/10969.pdf.

Other Options

If you don't qualify for Medicare coverage, there are other coverage options depending on your situation, including:

Insurance: If you happen to have long-term care insurance, check to see if it covers in-home care. Or if you have a life insurance policy, see if it can be utilized to pay for care.

Medicaid: If your income is low enough, all states offer Medicaid programs that will pay for some forms of in-home care. To investigate this, contact your local Medicaid office.

Veterans Assistance: If you're a veteran, some communities have a Veteran-Directed Home and Community Based Service program, which give veterans a flexible budget to pay for in-home care.

Also available to wartime veterans and their spouses is a benefit called "Aid and Attendance" that helps pay for in-home care, as well as assisted living and nursing home care.

To be eligible, you must need assistance with daily living activities like bathing, dressing or going to the bathroom. And, your annual income must be under \$21,466 – minus medical and long-term care expenses. If you're a surviving spouse of a veteran, your income must be below \$13,794 to be eligible. Your assets must also be less than \$80,000 excluding your home and car.

FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS

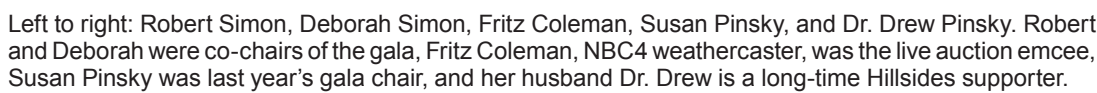

A GOOD CAUSE FOR BIG PAWS

If you are a regular reader of this column, you have probably read previous articles about Animazonia Wildlife Foundation, and you'll most likely be interested in this update on what's happening at

their sanctuary lately. For those of you who are new to Animazonia, it is a non-profit organization that provides a permanent home for big cats rescued from threatening conditions in captivity or displaced from the wild. They offer educational programs to build public understanding of big cats and their natural place in our world.

I first found out about Animazonia five years ago, while shopping at one of their benefit yard sales here in town and I was immediately interested in learning more about what they do and how I could help out. I visited their sanctuary in Riverside, CA soon after that sale, where I met two big cats living there at the time; Magic, a gorgeous Asian black leopard and Saba, an enormous African lioness, both of whom enjoyed the luxury of living their lives out in a beautiful setting with loving, attentive caretakers.

Today, Animazonia is home to two wild-born California mountain lions, Olive and Leno. They were discovered at three months of age, orphaned and abandoned under a car in Burbank, malnourished and riddled with parasites. Due to their young age and lack of hunting skills, local wildlife experts agreed that the cubs could not survive if released back into the wild. After rehabilitation by California Wildlife Center and two years at ZooToYou in central California, Olive and Leno found their permanent home with Animazonia in 2014.

Much work must be done to help wild cats habituate in captivity, and I was fortunate enough to catch up with Olive and Leno's trainer, Kristi Slane, who shared lots of exciting news about how the two cats are getting along in their new home. Kristi, a 10-year veteran of animal training, worked for the County of Riverside as an animal behaviorist before volunteering at Animazonia. With a big heart for helping big cats, Kristi is dedicated to teaching Olive and Leno new skills designed to make their lives in captivity fuller, happier and healthier.

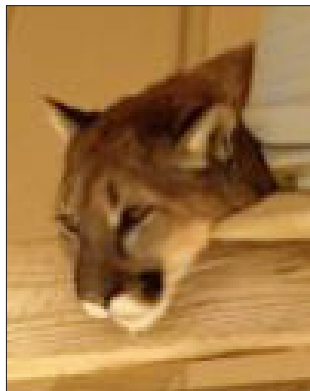
First among the many things that Olive and Leno are learning during their sessions with Kristi, is the ability to trust humans and interact to the extent necessary to keep them in good health. To accomplish this goal, Kristi uses a technique called target training. For this, she uses a stick with a ball tethered to the tip, which she invites the cat to touch with it's nose. Each time the cat responds positively by nosing the ball, Kristi rewards the cat with a click or a treat. This technique has proven to be successful in teaching the cats a variety of skills, including trust of people and willingness to perform tasks necessary for their livelihood.

The basic skills being taught to Olive and Leno are extremely important to their survival in captivity. For example, the cats need to be willing to do such things as go into a transport crate when necessary, whether it be to take a trip to the vet, or in the case of an emergency, to be relocated for their safety. Kristi is also teaching them to accept a simulated syringe, so that if/when it is necessary to give them medication, they will be familiar with enough with the process to take the syringe on command. While much of the training is meant to enhance the cats' physical health, the stimulating "games", which they seem to truly enjoy, benefit their mental health as well. Overall, the results are positive and helpful in assuring a happy, healthy lifestyle for those two beautiful beasts.

Within the next month or so, Animazonia plans to launch a "Who's Your Daddy?" campaign on their Facebook page. The purpose of the campaign is to raise funds for Olive and Leno's DNA testing, to be used in verifying their relationship to the adult males being tracked in the Santa Monica Mountains and Verdugo Hills area. If they can find Olive and Leno's father, it would not only be helpful in caring for their own health, but could also provide valuable DNA data on the condition of the cats in the wild, how far they travel, which routes they use, etc. The results will be posted on Father's Day, on the Animazonia Facebook page. This is a fun way for everyone to support Animazonia, by simply "liking" them on Facebook, and participating in this unique Father's Day affair.

I want to thank Olive and Leno's trainer, Kristi Slane for taking the time to chat with me about the exciting progress the cats are making, and many thanks to all of the good folks at Animazonia for their dedication on behalf of the animals. Maintaining their sanctuary and caring for the animals requires a lot of hard work and funding. They couldn't do it without the support of people like you and me doing what we can to help carry out the mission. 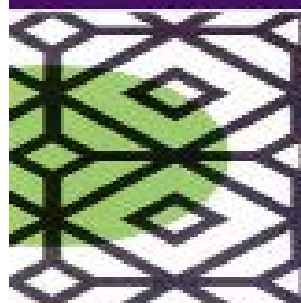

SEAN'S SHAMELESS REVIEWS: NIGHT TERRORS OF 1927

The duo comprising the Los Angeles synth-pop band, Night Terrors of 1927, formulate an interesting pair. Blake Sennett (guitarist) was a member of the successful indie rock band Rilo Kiley and The Elected. Jarrod Gorbel (vocals) was the singer of the The Honorary Title, an indie rock act in the 2000s. The two guys met in 2010 through mutual friends with no intentions in creating a band. About a year later, they started getting together casually to work on songs that fell out of their comfort zone. It was clear that both guys were trying to discover what they wanted out of music. After being musicians for well over a decade with other acts, they still weren't entirely fulfilled emotionally or artistically. The creative juices started kicking in and in 2013 they released their first single, "Watch The World Go Dark," online under the mysterious moniker Night Terrors of 1927. With much potential and praise from numerous publications, Atlantic Records quickly signed them. They released their debut EP, Guilty Pleas in November 2013 and went on tour to support that album. Last September, they released four-track EP, Anything to Anyone, which continued their anthem driven ways. Those songs on the EP carried over to the new 11-track compilation known as Everything's Coming Up Roses. The Night Terrors of 1927 debut LP is bursting with nostalgia, catharsis, and beauty in so many ways.

"Dust and Bones," which was found on their 2013 EP opens the record in a familiar way for previous fans. With Gorbel's huge, larger-than-life vocals present and Sennett's masterful synth work, "Dust and Bones" feels just as great it did over a year ago. Brand new song, "Running in Place," hits the floor running. It features Gorbel singing in a slightly darker manner. The song is packed with oomph and showcases background harmonies to really kick the chorus into high gear. Night Terrors of 1927 perform songs like everything is on the line at all times. There's so much gusto and glory found within their material that doesn't feel like a retreat of other musicians. "Perfect Day" slides in with a milder tempo, but still keeps the listener's head bobbing back and forth. The combination of Gorbel's power vocals and Sennett's glossy guitar contribution pushes this gem into a whole new category for Night Terrors of 1927. "When You Were Mine (ft. Tegan

& Sara)" is the band's gloriously epic single. Gorbel croons along with Tegan & Sara about the likes of a relationship on the verge of being lost forever. The dynamic contrast of the male/female voices works wonders for this superbly indie-synth jam.

Just when you think you have this band figured out, they throw you a curve ball with "Novocaine," a gentle tune that displays Gorbel's earnest lyrical side. "It Would Be An Honor" starts off with rapid piano keys, which quickly unravel into sounding like something from The Killers' Hot Fuss era. Frankly, if I had to compare Night Terrors of 1927 tone it would fall in the hybrid of The Killers, M83, and AFI. While

the amalgamation of modern rock with the pinnacle of 80s pop may be the most accurate depiction.

Three of the final four songs appear on the band's previous EP, but they are still arguably the best songs Night Terrors of 1927 have produced. "Always Be One" provides the finest chorus of all their songs. Gorbel's sings with a significant amount of vitality and power. Sennett drives the song with dazzling beats that oscillates in volume. "Shine" brings down the tempo once again, yet are these guys even capable of making a false move? Gorbel expresses he "doesn't want to be a gambler all his life," but the gamble he's making with this band is perhaps his finest wager yet. This is easily the freshest sounding band in years occupying the territory of indie-pop. There appears to be an abundance of compassion and spirit embedded within the duo's music. The labor of their efforts is clearly shown encompassing an 11-track LP full of musical layers, relatable lyrics, and a vibe unrivalled in the genre. The spirited intensity that is established is worth hearing for any and all individual listeners.

LIFE ‘NOT AS WE KNOW IT’ POSSIBLE ON SATURN’S MOON TITAN

A new type of methane-based, oxygen-free life form that could metabolize and reproduce similar to life on Earth has been modeled by a team of Cornell University researchers.

Taking a simultaneously imaginative and rigidly scientific view, chemical engineers and astronomers offer a template for life that could thrive in a harsh, cold world—specifically Titan, the giant moon of Saturn. A planetary body awash with seas not of water, but of liquid methane, Titan could harbor methane-based, oxygen-free cells.

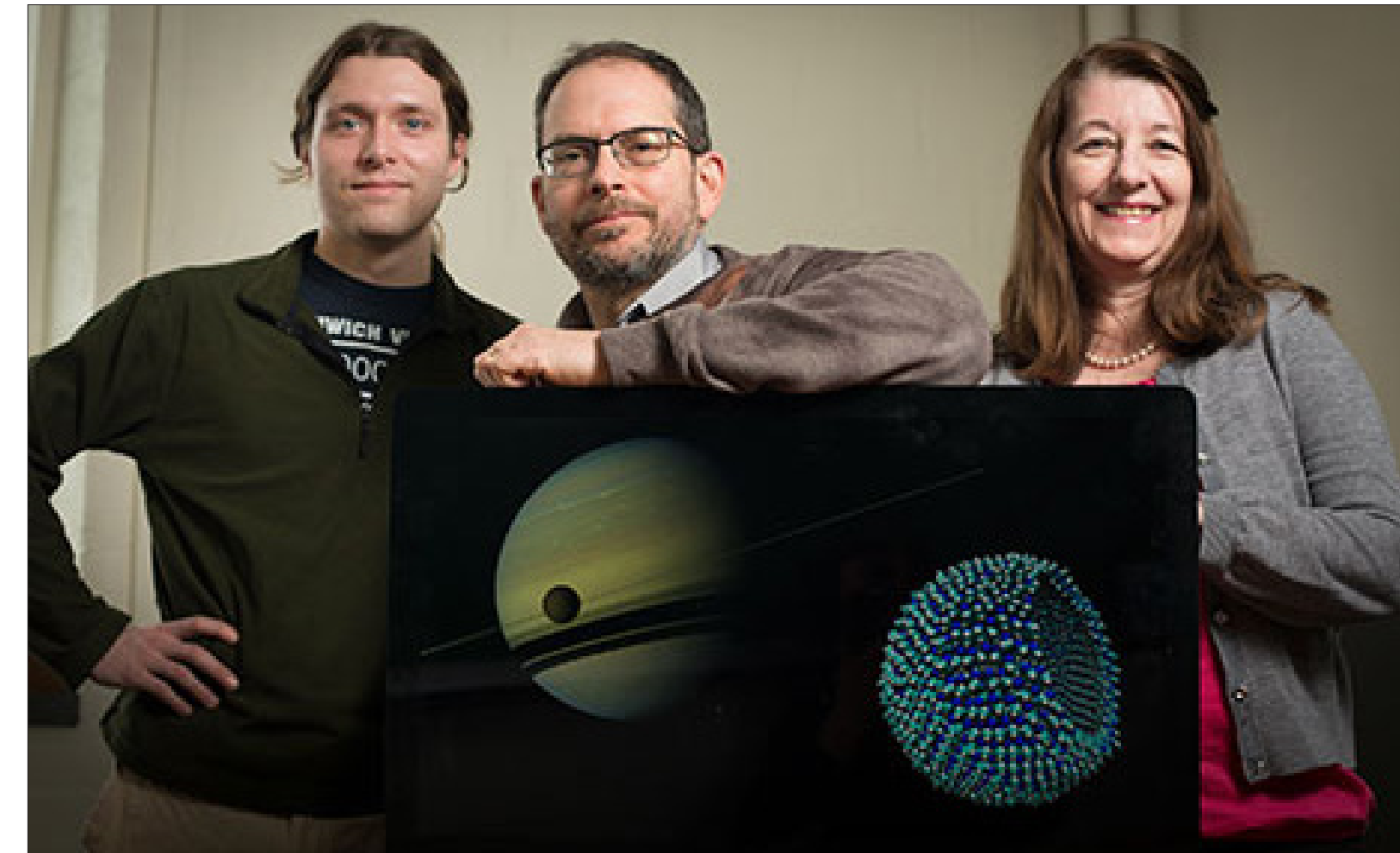
Their theorized cell membrane, composed of small organic nitrogen compounds and capable of functioning in liquid methane temperatures of 292 degrees below zero, is published in Science Advances, Feb. 27. The work is led by chemical molecular dynamics expert Paulette Clancy and first author James Stevenson, a graduate student in chemical engineering. The paper’s co-author is Jonathan Lunine, director for Cornell’s Center for Radiophysics and Space Research.

Lunine is an expert on Saturn’s moons and an interdisciplinary scientist on the Cassini-Huygens mission that discovered methane-ethane seas on Titan. Intrigued by the possibilities of methane-based life on Titan, and armed with a grant from the Templeton Foundation to study non-aqueous life, Lunine sought assistance about a year ago from Cornell faculty with expertise in chemical modeling. Clancy offered to help.

“We’re not biologists, and we’re not astronomers, but we had the right tools,” Clancy said. “Perhaps it helped, because we didn’t come in with any preconceptions about what should be in a membrane and what shouldn’t. We just worked with the compounds that we knew were there and asked, ‘If this was your palette, what can you make out of that?’”

On Earth, life is based on the phospholipid bilayer membrane, the strong, permeable, water-based vesicle that houses the organic matter of every cell. A vesicle made from such a membrane is called a liposome. Thus, many astronomers seek extraterrestrial life in what’s called the circumstellar habitable zone, the narrow band around a star in which liquid water could exist. But what if cells weren’t based on water, but on methane, which has a much lower freezing point?

The engineers named their theorized cell membrane an “azotosome,” “azote” being the French word for nitrogen. “Liposome” comes from the Greek “lipos” and “soma” to mean “lipid body”; by analogy,



“azotosome” means “nitrogen body.”

The azotosome is made from nitrogen, carbon and hydrogen molecules known to exist in the cryogenic seas of Titan, but shows the same stability and flexibility that Earth’s analogous liposome does. This came as a surprise to chemists like Clancy and Stevenson, who had never thought about the mechanics of cell stability before—they usually study semiconductors, not cells.

The engineers employed a molecular dynamics method that screened for candidate compounds from methane for self-assembly into membrane-

like structures. The most promising compound they found is an acrylonitrile azotosome, which showed good stability, a strong barrier to decomposition, and a flexibility similar to that of phospholipid membranes on Earth.

Clancy said the next step is to try and demonstrate how these cells would behave in the methane environment—what might be the analogue to reproduction and metabolism in oxygen-free, methane-based cells.

Lunine looks forward to the long-term prospect

of testing these ideas on Titan itself, as he put it, by “someday sending a probe to float on the seas of this amazing moon and directly sampling the organics.”

Stevenson said he was in part inspired by science fiction writer Isaac Asimov, who wrote about the concept of non-water-based life in a 1962 essay, “Not as We Know It.”

Said Stevenson: “Ours is the first concrete blueprint of life not as we know it.”

BORN WITH A SCREWDRIVER IN MY HAND

Some people understand compliments and take them as they come. Other people, like myself, wouldn’t know a compliment if it hit them in the face like a pie.

For a long time I had been under the impression my wife was giving me compliments. It takes a husband a long time to understand his wife and by the time he understands her, she has morphed into the next level of womanhood. The man who thinks he knows his wife needs a psychiatrist, preferably a woman psychiatrist.

For a number of years my wife said to me, which I thought was a compliment, “You must’ve been born with a screwdriver in your hand.”

I never thought of myself as a handyman, but these kinds of compliments gave me a little bit of confidence in my incompetence. Nothing is more dangerous than confident incompetence.

I try to do a little bit of work around the house, like fixing things and improve things. However, every time I start to fix something, something happens to make it worse.

PRESERVING YOUR DIGITAL LEGACY JUST GOT EASIER

As our lives become increasingly intertwined with the internet, more and more of our assets are developing in, or converting to, the digital world. We own email accounts, domain names, hosting accounts, blogs, social media accounts, cloud storage, apps, ebook libraries, and more. As such, a big part of my job is educating clients on how to preserve and manage the digital assets of their loved ones when they die or become incapacitated. It's no surprise Facebook also understands the emerging importance of digital assets and just released an exciting new tool to help friends and family manage the wall and profile of a deceased Facebook user. Before this change there were only two options: 1) Keep the page public, in which case anyone could post on the user's wall, or 2) have the page "memorialized" so only "friends" of the user could post on the wall. But either way, without the user's password loved ones could not accept new friend requests, update pictures, or pin important information on the user's wall. Last week, however, Facebook announced they will begin to allow a designated agent to manage a deceased user's page, wall, and profile. From now on all Facebook user's will have the option to choose a "legacy contact" - a family member or friend the user wants to be able to manage their account after they pass away. Alternately, a user can opt to have their Facebook account deleted immediately after they die. This is what Facebook had to say: Today we're introducing a new feature that lets people choose a legacy contact—a family member or friend who can manage their account when they pass away. Once someone lets us know that a person has passed away, we will memorialize the account and the legacy contact will be able to:

- Write a post to display at the top of the memorialized Timeline (for example, to announce a memorial service or share a special message)

- Respond to new friend requests from family members and friends who were not yet connected on Facebook
 - Update the profile picture and cover photo
- If someone chooses, they may give their legacy contact permission to download an archive of the photos, posts and profile information they shared on Facebook. Other settings will remain the same as before the account was memorialized. The legacy contact will not be able to log in as the person who passed away or see that person's private messages. Alternatively, people can let us know if they'd prefer to have their Facebook account permanently deleted after death. If you are a Facebook user, you can make a loved one your legacy contact by following these simple steps:
- Log into your Facebook account and open Settings.
 - Choose Security and then Legacy Contact at the bottom of the page.
 - After naming your legacy contact, you'll have the option to send them a personal message.

DON'T TRY THIS AT HOME

When you hear that someone managed to sell a home without representation, it's likely that the sale was to a family member, close friend, or a tenant who was already renting and living there. These exceptional cases are not the norm, and there are powerful reasons why it is so difficult to make a sale "by owner."

The biggest roadblock is that For Sale By Owners (FSBOs) aren't included in the Multiple Listing Service (MLS) that licensed agents and organizations use. A sign in the yard and an ad in the newspaper are no match for the widespread exposure gained from a listing visible on the MLS. Since the FSBO has no listing agreement providing for a sales commission, many agents won't show these homes with no promise of compensation. Again, this greatly reduces the number of potential buyers exposed to the offering, not to mention the fact that buyers who do express interest will not have been screened by a professional to determine their qualifications.

Perhaps the most hazardous aspect of selling "by owner" is the potential for legal oversights and complications. Real estate transactions are loaded with potential liability for unrepresented and unwitting sellers. One overlooked form or improper disclosure could generate an expensive lawsuit. Just as you wouldn't enter the courtroom without an attorney, you shouldn't sell your home without professional representation.

HOW TO ADD A LINK ON A FACEBOOK POST

A back link is a hyperlink that links from a site like Facebook, back to your own web site, they are also called inbound links. Methinks Greg Welborn might have taken a bit too uncritically the remarks Sen. Marco Rubio (R-FL) at last week's Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC). In his column last week, Greg warns that Iran and ISIS are "drawn from the same cloth". In his speech to CPAC, Sen. Rubio contended that although we could defeat ISIS militarily, President Obama chooses not to because he "doesn't want to upset Iran."

The problem with that argument is that Iran would like to see ISIS defeated at least as much as we would. Iran has publicly urged us to take a more active role in the fight, sent 2,000 troops in support of Iraq against ISIS last month and helped defend Baghdad.

Sectarianism tends to make a mess of things. There's Shiite Muslim Iran and Iraq against Sunni Muslim ISIS. President Assad of Syria is of the Shiite Alawite sect, so ISIS is after his neck, too - and we're in the position of choosing between the lesser of the monsters. There's no comparing the masses of Shiite Muslims slaughtered by Sunni Muslim ISIS to the number of Christian victims we hear about on the news.

That bloodthirsty, apocalyptic vision of ISIS is based in the Wahhabi sect of Sunni Islam, which inspired Al Qaeda before it. But the countries that finance the madrassas that instill Wahhabism (and that enforce the most draconian Sharia law) are those with which Big Oil makes its deals, like Saudi Arabia and the UAE - so you won't hear unkind words spoken against them at CPAC.

Sen. Rubio is a member of the Committee on Foreign Relations and the Select Committee on Intelligence. He should know better.

I think Israeli P.M. Benjamin Netanyahu does know better, but also knows about playing down to one's audience.

His remarks brought to mind the line about how someone saying they remember what happened at Woodstock shows they weren't really there. The P.M. warns of the dangers of the deal being worked out at the 7-nation (U.S., Russia, China, the U.K., France, Germany and Iran) nuclear talks in Geneva, but those involved say the information publicly out there is false; that anyone claiming to know what's going on really hasn't a clue.

P.M. Netanyahu, like Greg and Sen. Rubio, tries to conflate Iran, a nation with a diverse population of 80 million whose history goes back millennia and which does hold elections, with ISIS, a group numbering in the tens of thousands, which has been around in its current form since 2013 and considers democracy "deviant".

There's a push to have us forcefully state our demands, and then if Iran refuses and walks away, to accept that "no deal is better than a bad deal". That approach was tried under President George W. Bush. He insisted on a "zero-enrichment" condition, and as a result the 164 centrifuges Iran had in 2003 number some 19,000 today.

Sen. Rubio wasn't the only speaker talking foreign policy at CPAC. When asked how he'd handle ISIS, Gov. Scott Walker (R-WI) compared it to union-busting. "If I can take on 100,000 protestors, I can do the same across the world." It was this remark that brought the tweet from Sen. Warren quoted above. It was even too much for former Texas Gov. Rick Perry (R): "These are Americans. You are talking about, in the case of ISIS, people who are . . . the face of evil. To try to make the relationship between them and the unions is inappropriate."

Gov. Walker explained the connection to foreign policy; that as a result of President Reagan's firing of air traffic control union members in 1981, "years later, documents released by the Soviet Union" showed "it sent a message" that "we weren't to be messed with." Asked about Walker's claim, Jack Matlock, ambassador to the Soviet Union under Reagan, calls it "utter nonsense. . . there's no evidence of that whatever."

Donald Trump explained his approach to ISIS would be to "just hit 'em really hard." As for Iran, "you can make the right deal if you have the right negotiator."

Delivering CPAC's opening remarks; Sarah Palin offered probably the most important reminder regarding our foreign policy - about how those long deployments in Iraq and Afghanistan have led to more problems in our vets with PTSD, suicides, increased divorce rates, unemployment, etc. She blames the Obama Administration.

In his blog commenting on Palin's remarks, Bob Cesca listed a number of bills (HR 466 Wounded Veteran Job Security Act, HR 1168 Veterans Retraining Act, HR 1171 Homeless Veterans Reintegration Program, HR 1293 Disabled Veterans Home Improvement and Structural Alteration Grant) which were passed when Democrats controlled the House, but later killed by Republican-led filibusters in the Senate.

Foreign policy wasn't the only topic at CPAC. Former HP exec Carly Fiorina called the idea of a Republican "War on Women" a "lie" - then suggested women wouldn't be all that concerned with the further restrictions on reproductive health access she'd support. One of the most popular speakers was Phil Robertson of "Duck Dynasty", who shared with attendees his thoughts on sexually transmitted diseases ("Jesus is the only thing between you and herpes").

In the meantime, Congress finally passed a clean funding bill for the Department of Homeland Security, after weeks of Republicans holding it hostage. They figured they had to do something, especially with that Netanyahu appearance not working out as they'd hoped. According to an NBC / WSJ poll, Americans by a 48% to 30% margin felt House Speaker John Boehner (R-OH) blew it by not working with the White House on the visit. While according to Gallup, during the time the Prime Minister was over here in the States, approval for President Obama shot up by five points.

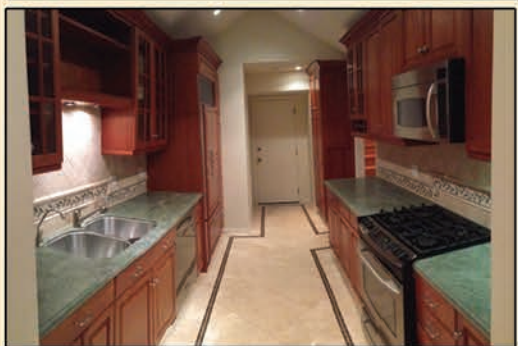
